BOARD PROFILES

MICHAEL HARBISON: PRESIDENT

Michael competed in the last Head of the River on the Torrens in 1968, winning the Under 16's. He rowed in the St Peters College first eight, competing at the first Head of the River held at West Lakes.

Michael was very active as a rowing parent, supporting both Wilderness and St Peters College. He served as Rowing SA Chairman from 1998 to 2003 and Lord Mayor of Adelaide from 2003 to 2009.

Michael was appointed as President of Rowing SA in 2015.

PHILIP PATERSON: CHAIR (Appointed Director)

Attended 6 of 10 meetings. (Leave of absence for 4 meetings)

Philip was appointed to the Board in June 2015 to be the first "Appointed" Director under the new Constitution. The Board elected Philip as Chair in August 2015. A Chartered Accountant and partner with Grant Thornton for 30 years, Philip left the firm in 2012 to achieve a change of pace and to establish his own consultancy specializing in planning, problem solving and governance. Philip's broad financial and commercial experience is valuable to the Rowing SA Board.

Philip has not rowed competitively but has connections to rowing that attracted him to Rowing SA, including many hours rowing dinghies around Goolwa and the Coorong as a child. Both Philip's children rowed with Scotch College and Philip continues to be a supporter of the Scotch rowing program. In 2010 Philip was lucky enough to purchase an 18 foot Ken Basset "Liz" timber, sliding seat scull from its builder living on Scotland Island on the Hawkesbury River. Philip's wife Sandra has recently taken to rowing. In support of that Philip purchased a Race 1 Wave-cutter single scull in 2015.

Three of the four family members are involved in recreational rowing. Philip looks forward to building the strength of Rowing SA in order to support everyone participating in rowing in South Australia.

Attended 7 of 9 meetings.

For 25 years, Georgina presented Adelaide's premier weekend news bulletin on Channel 9.

While currently involved primarily with schools James remains sympathetic to the needs of clubs and believes firmly in a united, productive and successful rowing community.

RICHARD O'DEA: BOARD MEMBER (Elected Secretary)

Attended 7 of 8 meetings.

Richard was appointed to the Board in August 2015 and is a member of the Riverside Rowing Club. He was a competing Masters rower for Riverside from 2007 to 2013 and is currently taking a break from competing due to family (primarily children's sport) commitments. He is the parent of a schoolboy rower for Pulteney Grammar School.

Richard is a Principal at the legal practice, Madsen O'Dea, and was previously the Managing Partner of a mid-tier corporate and commercial legal practice in Adelaide. Attended 7 of 10 meetings.

Steve's involvement in rowing began at school, including in the First VIII, followed by a couple of seasons at Adelaide University Boat Club. He returned to rowing through the Masters at Riverside where he also served on their committee for several years and was boat captain. As well as local and National regattas, he has also completed at a number of FISA World Masters Championships. In addition to competing, he is a level 3 coach and an RA umpire. He has also participated in a number of other sports including rugby at state and junior national level, sailing, hockey and soccer coaching.

Steve has had two terms on the RSA Board, 1998 - 2011, during which the last building extension and the course upgrade to international standard occurred and more recently 2013 to the present, a period of major changes in the management of all sports driven by the Australian Sports Commission. He has also served on a number of school boards. This background in both rowing, the more recent history of the Association from SARA to RSA and management through boards has allowed him to serve both the interests of the rowing community as well as the growth and development of rowing in SA.

Having now served a total of 20 years on the RSA board, Steve has decided to not stand for re-election but has confidence that the association is in good hands for future growth and wishes the new board well for the future.

REPORT FROM THE CHAIR OF ROWING SA

It has been another successful 12 months and I thank the Board and the Rowing SA staff for their ongoing support. David Hutton as CEO has continued to listen and deliver to the expectations of the rowing community. Together with a small number of dedicated staff and the support of the Board we have continued to roll out the current Strategic Plan, due to expire next year. The Board has created multiple opportunities for feedback and while there is always more to do, we continue to receive positive comments on the direction we are taking in the development of the sport of rowing in SA. The 2018/19 Season has been highly successful:

- Participation has been strong with around 1700 registered rowers.
- State representatives continue to be competitive, aided by a continuation of upgraded support to the program (Please see the full list of State Team Athletes and Results on pages 23 and 24).
- Participation and success in the Masters State Team Program has strengthened. (Please see the full list of Masters State Team Athletes and Results on page 26.)
- SA representation internationally has been outstanding (Please see the full list of SA Athletes of National Teams on page 22).
- The ongoing demand for increased boat storage signals that the sport is healthy and growing.
- Increased club engagement and coach development.
- Enhanced regatta racing live streaming offering, adding the feature of a large video screen on the main lawns at both our State Championships and Head of the River in 2019 very well received by the membership.

INFRASTRUCTURE

We remain eager to ensure that the infrastructure at West Lakes is well positioned to meet the needs of rowing into the future. We successfully applied for a grant through the Office of Recreation and Sport in 2017 which has been used to conduct a major infrastructure review.

On the back of that facilities review, the Board is working to prove a business case and seek funding options for a development over the coming years:

- The State and Federal elections have stalled any meaningful discussions regarding funding.
- The Office of Recreation, Sport and Racing (ORS&R) SA has in recent months launched a statewide review of sporting infrastructure. RSA has been engaged in the recent consultation process, and our progress will be dependent on the outcomes of that ORS&R initiative.
- David Hutton has maintained discussions with "allied" course users (West Lakes Aquatic Centre, Paddle SA, DragonBoat SA, Triathlon SA and other aquatic sports) as the government favors multi-use sporting hubs over single sport investment.

As a Board we are also mindful and supportive of facilities development at other sites. We look forward to working with all schools and clubs to improve what the sport can offer.

The ongoing success of the **OAR Café** has been a sound financial decision for the Association and provides a valued service to the rowing and broader community. We are lucky to have partnered with Rik and Alex in enhancing the benefits we enjoy from that part of our infrastructure – they are truly part of our community.

BOARD SUB-COMMITTEES

In 2016 the Board introduced subcommittees to replace the Commissioner positions and we now have sub-committees for:

- Finance, Audit and Risk
- Buildings and Facilities
- Clubs & Schools
- Masters
- Athletes
- Umpires and Volunteers

These committees are up and running and provide an avenue for new people participating in the governance of the sport. Please get involved if you have a desire, and contact the Rowing SA office for more information. This year the Board re-established the role of "Athlete Commissioner" and we thank Matt Hooper for accepting that role. The purpose was to enhance member support to provide a one on one advisor that may assist people feeling their concerns do not warrant a more formal approach to RSA in terms of state team selection, but are still looking for some support or advice.

We have also re-thought the role of the Clubs and Schools Committee and resolved that its purpose moving forward will be to plan and present two or three Member Forums each year. These forums will be in addition to the introduction of two forums aimed at bringing together Club Presidents and School Rowing Directors to be held mid and end of season – the agenda will be set around "what's working and what's not".

VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers – *what can I say*? Without them we don't have a sport. Their collective effort has increased, delivering great regattas throughout the season, Winter Series and Time Trial events for all athletes. We need to thank and applaud those who have put their hands up for this task and those who have come up with creative ways of adding to the numbers. We are in need of more volunteers in the future and our Umpires and Volunteer's sub-committee is looking into this. We may have to become more demanding about the provision of volunteers from clubs and schools to ensure we deliver high quality regattas.

We are holding a Boat Race Official (BRO) Introductory Course in August 2019 and have more than 25 interested registrants. Fantastic – looking forward to the growing support.

Personally, I commenced training to be a BRO this year, but was interrupted, however I look forward to reengaging in the upcoming season– I hope others help me support the volunteers.

ROWING SA CONSTITUTION

We held a Special General Meeting following the 2018 AGM, to discuss and approve some "housekeeping" issues to tidy up the functionality of our Constitution. Your Board thanks the membership for supporting the recommended changes.

The other previously flagged changes around membership and voting rights will be presented at a later SGM following further consultation with those that do not understand the benefits of moving to a contemporary Constitution. This project stalled this year due to my prolonged absence as Chair.

2019 FINANCIALS

The audited financial statements are available for all members to review. I have summarized the obvious key figures below.

The operating result for 2019 is broadly in line with the budgeted result.

During the year the Board has addressed an inherited anomaly being the lack of depreciation of buildings. Buildings have a finite life and the Australian Accounting Standards call for buildings to be depreciated. Given the original building is now 45 years old we have applied a useful life for buildings of 100 years. This has resulted in (see note 24 to the financial statements):

- A prior year depreciation adjustment of \$341,854
- Restatement of the 2018 results by adding a depreciation charge of \$21,614
- An additional depreciation charge in the current year of \$21,614

Your Board remains concerned that the cash generated is keeping the organization healthy but is short of what is needed to further enhance the facilities and program offering to members. We continue to conserve costs and seek new revenue opportunities. In my opinion, a healthy result for the Association would be a doubling of the cash generated from Rowing Activities which would translate to a cash surplus

of approximately \$200,000 or a profit after depreciation of \$120,000 (2018 - \$24,654). An increase in that order equates to an average of less than \$50 per registered member per annum and would help your organization move to another level for the benefit of members. The board will be exploring this direction during the 2020 forums mentioned earlier.

As noted in the opening paragraph, the Board's current Strategic Plan expires in 2020 so we will be developing a new 3 year plan – if you would like to have some input please contact me or David Hutton.

Your Association remains financially sound and continues to improve each year in service delivery under the leadership of David Hutton and the Board.

THANK YOU

2019 has seen the resignation of four valued Board Members:

- Steve Pennington after some 20 years of service to the administration of rowing in SA.
- Richard O'Dea (work commitments) Richard's legal background has been invaluable to your Association and its Board.
- James Hammond (work relocation interstate) James specifically provided a valued connection to and perspective from, our School based membership.
- Georgina McGuiness (work commitments) Georgina specifically provided valued input into our marketing, PR, social media and communications.

Each of these Board members made an outstanding contribution to the governance of Rowing SA and I thank them on behalf of the Board and the Association Membership. We have not received nominations to replace all of these vacancies at the upcoming AGM – the Board may identify some suitable skills-based appointments to fill two vacancies through to the 2020 AGM.

At this year's AGM, Jamie Grant will be reappointed to the Board, Jarrad Schar (Scotch College Rowing Director) will join us and Shannen Graham (Chartered Accountant - Perks) will be confirmed in her role – a temporary appointment during this year.

On a personal note, I would like to thank my board, the RSA staff and the rowing community for their support and best wishes during my "sick leave" from February to May this year. I am back on deck and looking forward to achieving my Umpire qualification this season and generally advancing the best interests of Rowing SA and the rowing community as a Board member.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

We have just completed another busy and rewarding rowing season in 2018/19, with many achievements to reflect upon and celebrate, as we turn our eyes towards the challenges of the season ahead. Over the past year we have seen our diverse range of athletes, coaches, volunteers and officials performing well locally, as well at state, national and international level. We have welcomed new corporate partners and communication strategies, further developed our West Lakes facility, and continued working on local regatta, club, coach and athlete development initiatives – all summarised below and throughout this year's Annual Report.

COMPETITIONS & SPORT DEVELOPMENT

In local competitions, we saw another increase this season with approximately 1700 competitors taking part in a season that culminated with the successful 2-day State Championships despite the heat (jointly hosted by Seymour and Loreto Colleges), and the Masters State Championships at the end of the season. The Head of the River Regatta drew large crowds of spectators to watch the 1162 school aged athletes entered across all events. Pembroke School hosted this regatta, creating a great inclusive atmosphere including the giant video screen, live-streaming of races and post-race interviews again conducted by former ABC Radio personality Peter Walsh. St Peter's Schoolboys First Eight won their 4th consecutive title, and the Scotch College Schoolgirls First Eight won their event in a hotly contested race. Including the Winter Series regattas, Rowing SA hosted 25 regattas, 18 locally at West Lakes, 2 at the River Torrens, 2 at Port Adelaide, and 1 each at Murray Bridge, Berri and Mannum. Following positive feedback last year, we again conducted the 2nd Grade State Championships as part of the Riverland Regatta, held at Berri in December with a record number of competitors and spectators.

Our top-level athletes performed well in both interstate and overseas competitions, and we are extremely proud of our SA rowers to have represented Australia at the 2018 World Championships in Bulgaria – Alex Hill, Molly Goodman, Olympia Aldersey and Jed Altschwager. Alex again won a Gold medal in the Men's Four at the World Championships, Molly won Silver in the Women's Four, and Jed took out Silver at his inaugural World Championships in the PR3 Men's Pair event. Jed also won a gold medal with Will Smith in the PR3M2- at the 2019 FISA International Para-Rowing Regatta. Alex capped off a wonderful year by being a key member of the Men's Four that was named *Men's Crew of the Year* at FISA's 2018 World Rowing Awards. We also congratulate Angus Dawson, Mitch Reinhard and Alannah Gilsmore for representing Australia at the 2019 Under 23 World Championships, as well as Celia Cowan, Oscar McGuinness, and Katelyn Nicholson who represented Australia in the Under 21 Trans-Tasman Cup against New Zealand this year. We are extremely proud of these wonderful athletes who are great ambassadors for our sport and the SA rowing community. A complete list of SA's national team athletes can be found on page 22.

We were also proud to see Brett Ralph win Rowing Australia's national *Volunteer of the Year Award* for his service as an Umpire and Boat Race Official here in SA, as well as at National and International Regattas over the past year. Brett volunteers as an Umpire and is being trained as a Rowing Australia Technical Delegate for National Regattas. He is also employed part-time by Rowing SA to manage the West Lakes Regatta Course & Infrastructure (pontoons, underwater cabling/buoy system, umpire boats & equipment).

In the 2019 Interstate Regatta at Penrith, SA was well represented in all boat classes as we continue to build on the strong foundations laid in recent years with our state program. We sincerely appreciate the

support of Jason Lane and Christine MacLaren at SASI and their selection panel, State Team Manager Jacki Grant, as well as the Clubs and Schools who supported the program with boats and equipment. We say "a huge thank you and well done" again to our State Team Athletes and Coaches for their efforts this year – See the full list of names and results on pages 23 & 24.

Please see Sam Jordan's Development Report and the SASI Report for more details about the wide range of development and pathway programs conducted over the season. Thanks to Sam and Christine MacLaren from SASI for their work and passion in this area.

Rowing SA acknowledges and thanks the South Australian Sports Institute (SASI) and Rowing Australia who support our athletes and the State Talent Pathway programs. We have a long-standing partnership with SASI and look forward to continuing our work with Jason Lane and Christine MacLaren in further developing the rowing pathways, in conjunction with our Clubs, Schools and Athletes.

FACILITIES & INFRASTRUCTURE

Rowing SA continues to manage and make extensive use of our property at West Lakes, and the Alex Ramsay Regatta Course for year-round rowing and other activities. The non-rowing activities include Canoeing, Dragon Boating, Triathlon and Open Water Swimming, as well as over 15,000 school students who use the waterway and some course infrastructure each year as participants in the West Lakes Aquatic Centre program (under the State Government's Department of Education & Child Development) – a tenant at Rowing SA's West Lakes facility.

Several facility and infrastructure upgrade projects were undertaken over the past year:

- In its second year of operation the OAR Café/Kitchen/Bar facilities and offerings were further upgraded. We value our positive working relationship with Rik Fisher, Alex Smith and their team – a great addition to the Rowing community and wider community as well.
- The new Boatshed areas created last year are now being fully utilised.
- The old Rowing SA storage shed was transformed into an Athlete and Coach High Performance area for use by the SASI Rowing and Canoe programs. The project also involved a refurbishment of the Indoor Rowing room, which is now benefiting the entire rowing community and getting more use on a weekly basis.
- A range of other landscaping and small facility maintenance and upgrade tasks have been undertaken and continue in the off-season period.



CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT (CONT.)

PARTNERSHIPS & COMMUNICATIONS

Rowing SA thank our partners and supporters for their ongoing support over the 2018/19 season. The State Government through the Office of Recreation, Sport & Racing (ORS&R), along with the Department of Planning, Transport & Infrastructure (DPTI) continue to provide funding and support to maintain our operational services, development programs and management of the Regatta Course at West Lakes. Our strong relationships continue with the City of Charles Sturt and City of Adelaide Councils, especially with our events held at West Lakes and on the River Torrens.

We welcomed new corporate support this season from Grant Thornton, who provided our audit services as part of a national deal with Rowing Australia. Bendigo Bank also came on board through the West Beach & Districts Community Bank Branch as the major sponsor of our 2019 State Championships, as well as providing a new Defibrillator which has been installed under our main stairs at West Lakes. COMPETITIONS AND MEMBERSHIP REPORT

Rowing SA held 21 Regattas across with 2018/19 season in addition to the annual Winter Series Regattas and Time Trials with participation in most regattas increasing on 2017/18 numbers.

The Winter Series and Time Trials held through the July – September period continue to attract growing interest. We continue to experiment with the Winter Series, a relatively new introduction to the Rowing SA Calendar, in order to find a good balance in competition offerings for athletes new to the sport, athletes engaged in club winter school programs, and athletes looking to break up their winter training. This is complemented by the General Entry Time Trials, jointly hosted by Rowing SA and SASI, that provide athletes an opportunity to track their progress alongside some of the best athletes in the state. This season we introduced a stand-alone Winter Membership fee for these events to assist in ensuring these events are properly resourced as their popularity grows.

As has become customary, our main season began with a series of long distance events comprised of the Head of the Port, 3 Mile Eight Race at the Murray Bridge Regatta, and Round the Island Regatta, which continue to attract crews training for the ever popular Head of the Yarra event in Melbourne at the end of November. Following this, the 2018-19 season moved through to standard 6-8 lane regattas, with the first half of the season culminating in the Riverland Regatta & 2nd Grade State Championships held in Berri this year with increasing depth across the 2nd Grade events, and continued support and participation from all parts of the rowing community.

Once again the February and March Regattas were the most popular of the season with the School Premiership Series Regattas and West Lakes Regattas attracting between 830-1050 competitors. While it is great to have this number of athletes engaged in our sport at this time, it is also the period where our somewhat limited number of Boat Race Officials and Volunteers are under the most pressure. As a result, to curtail the length of some regatta days we implemented the rotation of some events - this meant that some groups did not have an event available to them at these regattas. While we acknowledge this is not an ideal solution, we believe we need to recognise the needs and limitations of our Officials and Volunteers in the structuring an planning of regattas, and ensure that we are constantly looking to grow our numbers in line with increased demand for access to competition opportunities.

Our newly updated Weather and Condition Management Policy was unfortunately required to be enacted for Day 1 of the SA State Championships in early March. This meant that a handful of events had to be modified or cancelled. In spite of this, entries in the SA State Championships continue to grow with entries on a per boat basis the highest they have ever been. This has led to larger and more competitive fields in most events, however many of our Open events have not experienced this same growth. Rectifying this will be a significant focus moving forward for the association into the 2019/20 season and beyond, and one that will require input from all clubs and schools across our sport.

DEVELOPMENT REPORT

Development within SA's rowing community has seen some great improvements over the year. There have been two successful underage development trips – the Pathway Eight group travelling to Sydney in April and the Club Development trip once again travelling to Perth in July. These have both seen an uplift in interest at the senior school level, as well as transfer to club training and racing which is vital to the growth and development of our sport.

Rowing SA thanks the Torrens Rowing Club and Christine MacLaren from the SA Sports Institute for helping to drive the 'Row4Gold', Talent Search, Talent Id and Para Rowing programs throughout the season. These programs have delivering positive results in terms of developing and retaining young rowers, as well as introducing new athletes into our sport – we appreciate all the hard work of the coaches involved (see pages 41 & 42 for more details on these programs).

There has been some growth outside of our usual school programs with two 'Riggers' programs being run throughout the year – this is a national introductory program being piloted in Primary Schools with Indoor Rowing machines. Now that the association has some experience in this this space, further growth is expected through effective marketing and promotion. Further transfer of students from non-rowing schools is expected from this program in the near future. We have also piloted a similar model with some Corporate organisations and look to develop this concept as a way of getting more people to experience the joy of rowing.

The Masters State Team has seen greater interest and numbers in recent years, and for the first time South Australia was represented in all 4 boat classes at the 2019 Australian Masters Championships in Champion Lakes, Western Australia –Eights and Quads in both the men's and women's division, with some strong performances (see full crew lists and results on page 26 and a more detailed report on page 39), along with SA being well represented in many Club events at the Championships.

Coach development has continued in an upward direction with the coach seminar series at the beginning of the season leading to an uplift in overall accredited coach numbers of 20%. Six sessions were presented on a range of topics from coach professional issues to technique fault identification and correction. This will continue next season, commencing with a Coaches Conference in September and an aim to lift the overall level of coaching and official accreditation numbers throughout the state.

The number of Boat Race Officials (BRO's) has stagnated over the past few years, however we will also see an uplift in this area during the coming season with over 25 people registering to do the Level 1 Introductory BRO course through the off-season. This presents a great opportunity to provide more support to our dedicated band of regatta officials, and opens up options to conduct regattas in more than one location on a given day to handle future growth. On the administration side the association is furthering its compliance with new Working with Children checks and other necessary government regulations and compliance. Overall our volunteers are in good shape with the ability to cover all programmed regattas in the upcoming season.

COURSE MANAGER'S REPORT

This year's main purchase has been a new 60hp Mercury 'Big Foot' outboard motor for the course barge. These motors are designed to be used on houseboats and generally used on commercial boats. Over the last 12 months we have clocked up 200 engine hours with no operational problems.

500 new soft pliable buoys have been purchased and are slowly being introduced into service as old buoys fail or are lost. It is hoped that another 500 buoys will be purchased in the next 12 months.

Please note that Lane 4 (indicated by yellow buoys), has a dual purpose. On Regatta days it easily identifies Lane 4 for both competitors and spectators. While in training, it will act as the neutral or safety lane that will separate rowing traffic. Please DO NOT row in this lane during training. Always refer to the 'Rowing Training Map' displayed on the finish pontoon. It clearly explains traffic flow and general rowing rules on the course. These are here for everybody's safety, so please follow diligently.

Rowing SA will continually reinforce DPTI Marine Rules for lighting that must be displayed on your boat during early morning /evening, and poor light conditions. There has been a fantastic response from the rowing public, so keep up the great work. There is a light sensitive Red light on the top level of the Finish Tower that will indicate when you should have lights on your boat (i.e. If the Red light is ON, you MUST have lights on your boat). Don't forget to replace your batteries when they start to dim, remembering that these lights need to be seen from 1km away.

UMPIRES AND VOLUNTEERS

Another season over, the regattas went very well and while some were run in conditions that could be described as difficult, as always they were run very safely. We did lose a significant part of one regatta in December due to wind and had to cancel some events for the younger rowers during the State Championships due to heat, all in accordance with the Rowing SA Weather and Condition Management Policy, other than that it was a good season.

With the addition of year 7 crews in recent seasons our athlete numbers have continued to increase, haveing gone up some 15% in the last few years and this is expected to continue. To help manage the additional pressure and demand this growth places on staffing regattas with umpires, Rowing SA Development Officer, Sam Jordan, has contacted most schools looking for new umpires. We now have a seminar in August with about 20 parents considering joining us - this will be a great help in the running of regattas moving forward and I must thank all the schools who have helped spread the word and encourage attendance.

We now have 5 umpire's catamarans, this has reduced the wash problems of the past and made racing more enjoyable for everyone. I can also report that all our umpires now have a working with children clearance and most, if not all, have completed first aid/CPR training, just another small but important thing we all do to make Rowing safer for all participants.

I would like to advise all Clubs that Vicky Knight has been presenting a 'Rowing & Regatta Preparation' presentation for both rowers and coxswains. I am told that it is very helpful for all involved, especially younger or new rowers, letting them know what to do and expect on regatta day. If you would like to find out more or would like to have a presentation at your school or club, please ask Vicky.

I will finish this report by first congratulating our new Level 2 umpires David Mahony and Peter Young. We welcome them warmly to our ranks. I am also very happy to announce Vicky Knight has now become a Level 3 Australian umpire. Well done all.

Finally, I must thank all the hard working umpires and volunteers for all the work they do, as without them we would not have the sport that we all enjoy so much.

It is hoped that the success of the 2018 Nationals will be the stimulus for an equal or bigger effort for next year's event.

2018-19 again proved to be a successful year for SASI Rowing, led by Head Coach Jason Lane, the program increased the numbers of representative athletes, both scholarship and graduates, on National Teams. Coxswain Alannah Gilsmore (Adelaide Rowing Club) was also selected to cox the U23 M8+, making eleven South Australian athletes, plus three coaches/support staff, with representation from SASI on all Australia Teams - Junior, U21, U23 and Senior (including para).

The continuing collaboration between states ensures that athletes are given the best opportunity for combinations for selection trials. South Australia worked with New South Wales athletes to give our emerging junior boys a good experience through Junior trials, with Nick Blackman (Pembroke) and James Andrewartha (St Peters College) in combinations until the last day. Unfortunately, no combination met the benchmark speed, but the experience has set the group up well for 2020 trials.

The State Pathway Program provides the underpinning programs to the SASI High Performance Program and works in collaboration with Rowing SA, and SA clubs and schools to ensure clear, functioning pathways for talented athletes. These programs encompass the identification and development of new and existing talent and aim to educate them in understanding what is required in high performance sport. Education sessions on time management, stretching, the importance of recovery, nutrition, and understanding training were delivered by SASI coaches and support staff to young athletes throughout the year.
