GOVERNANCE

Rowing SA follows the governance platform provided by Rowing Australia through the Rowing in Australia Framework and Whole of Sport Policies. As a Member Association, it is our responsibility to be compliant with the Governance Principles and continue to provide the underpinning framework from which rowing in Australia can grow and achieve sustainable success.

Rowing SA adopts the relevant required governance to comply with both the Australian Sports Commission's requirements and good governance principles.

The Board is responsible for setting the strategic direction of Rowing SA and has oversight of its activities. Each member of the Board is elected to serve terms up to 2-years. 3 Elected Directors are subject to re-election annually. Once nominations are received, board members are elected by the Rowing SA membership by way of secret ballot conducted at the AGM each year.

The Staff of Rowing SA, led by the CEO, are responsible for the day-to-day management and operation of Rowing SA in achieving the strategic direction set by the Board.

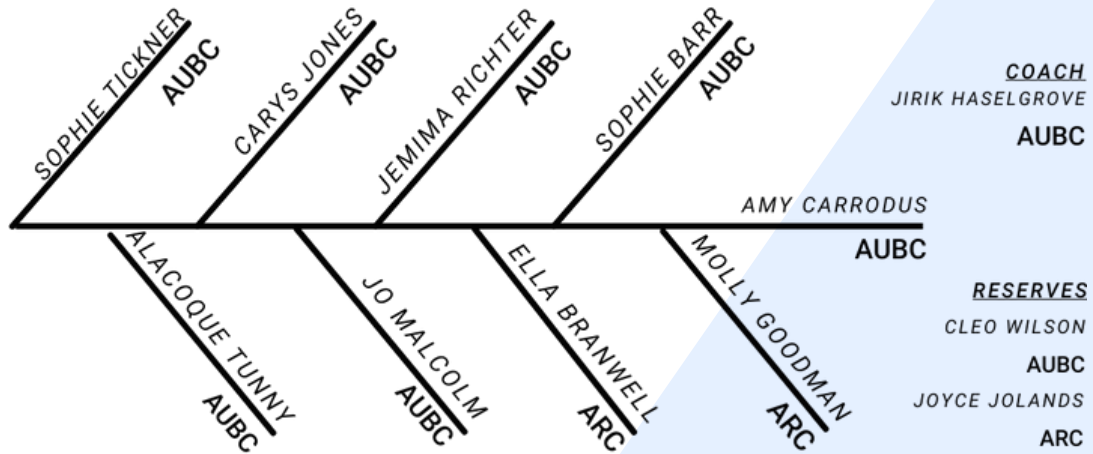

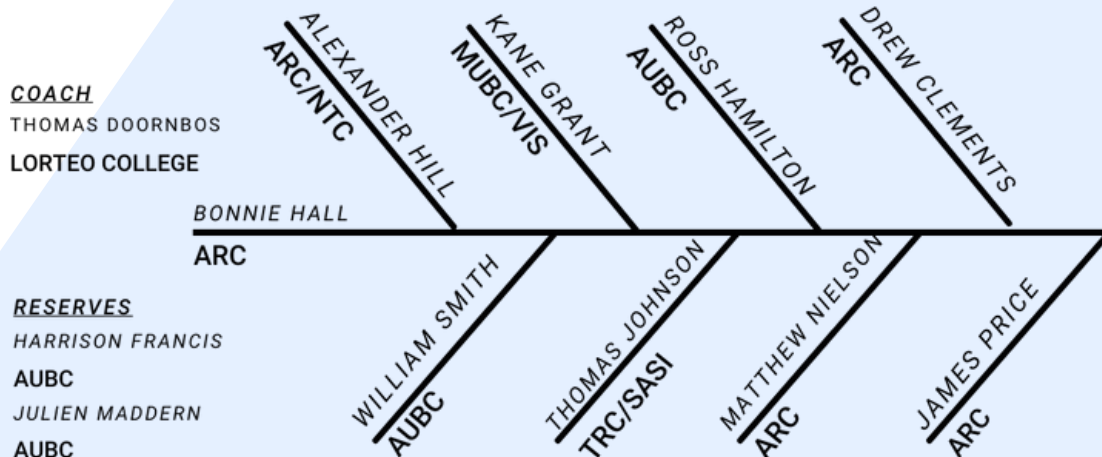
SOUTH AUSTRALIAN INTERSTATE TEAM REPORT

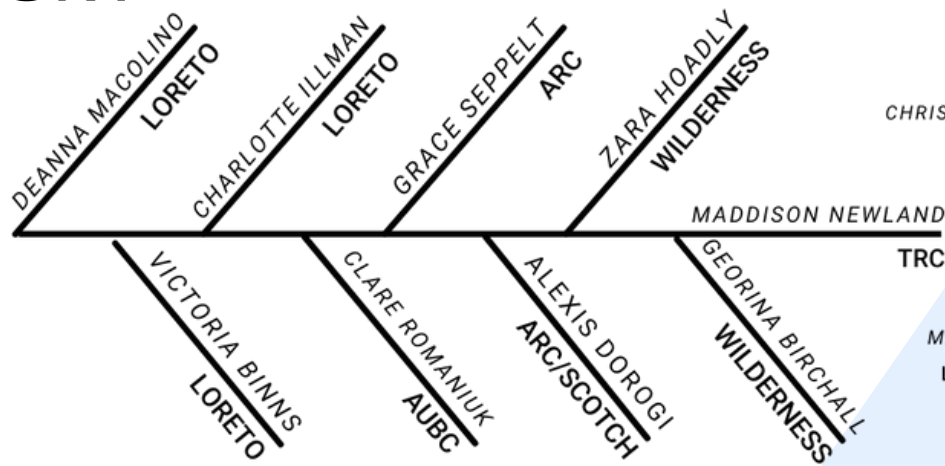
QUEENS CUP - WOMEN'S 8+

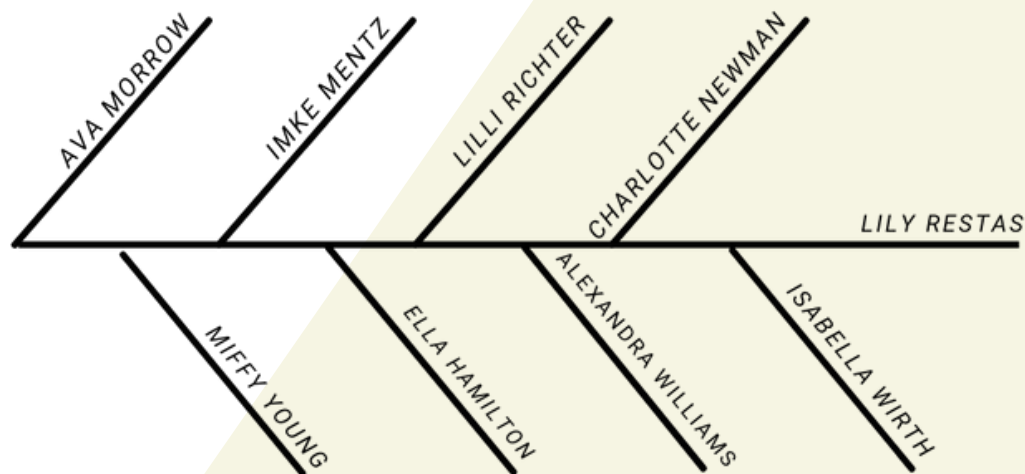
SOUTH AUSTRALIAN PATHWAY STATE TEAM REPORT

This year Walford won HOR and accepted the invitation to compete in the Pathway 8+ race.



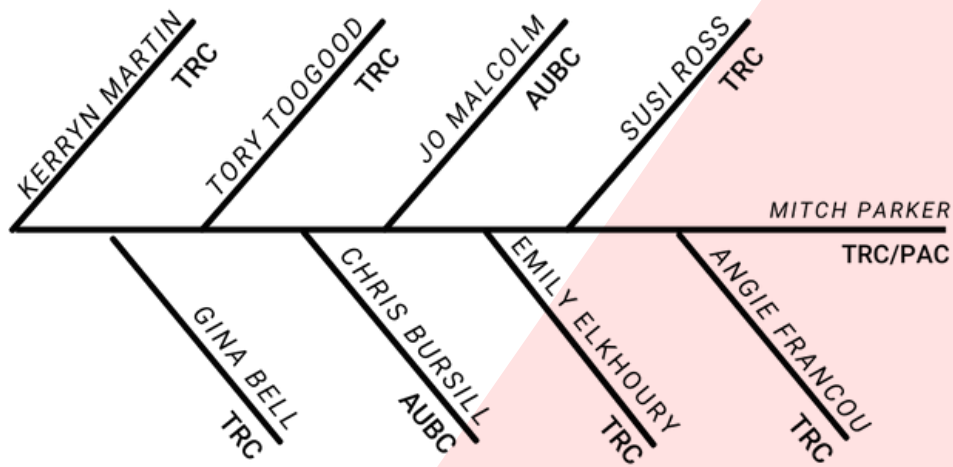
SOUTH AUSTRALIAN MASTERS STATE TEAM REPORT

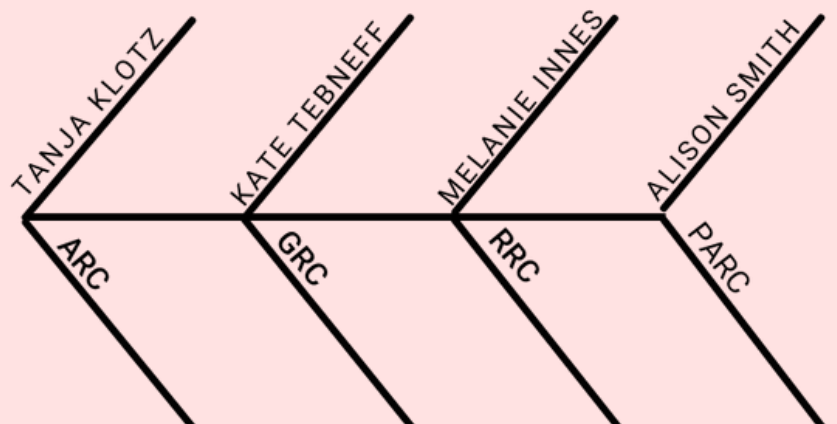

The Masters Women quad put up a tough fight against a very competitive field

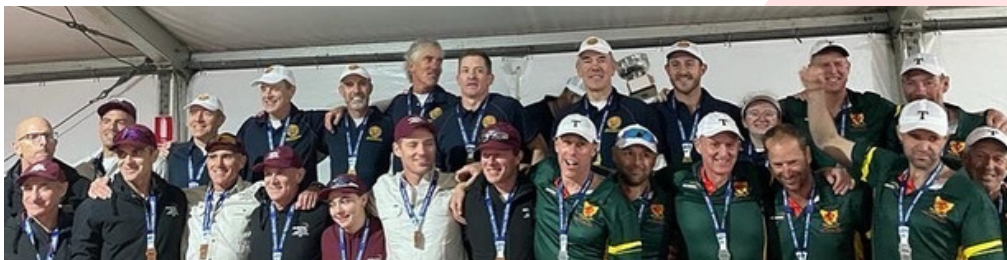

However, all their hard work paid off and they are now champions for the 2nd year in a row.



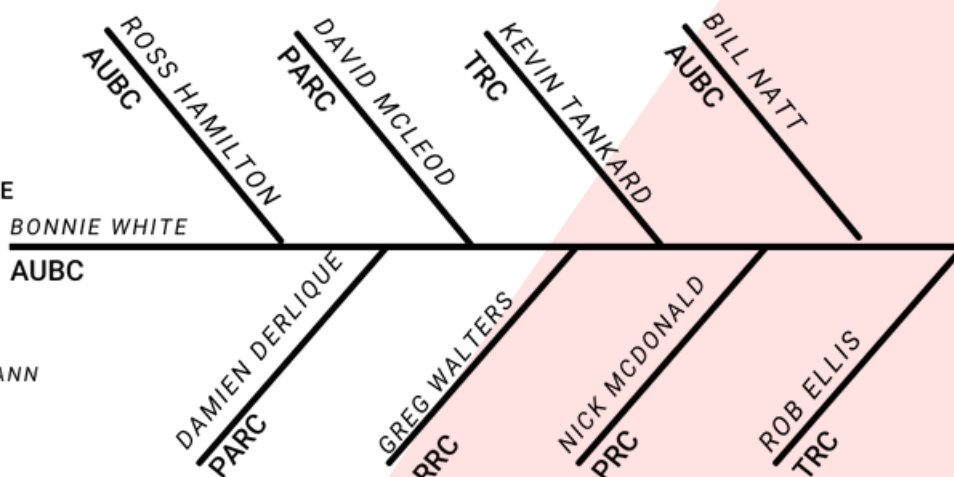

REPORT FROM THE CHAIR OF ROWING SA

The COVID-19 pandemic continued to be disruptive during the rowing season, however not as significant as what was seen in the previous three years. I want to acknowledge the significant additional work the office and all affiliated clubs have done to ensure the sport complied with all health measures and continued to operate safely. In June, we reached the halfway point of the 2021-2023 Rowing SA Strategic Plan. Some of the key Strategic achievements since the start of 2021 include:

- Increasing commercial partners and sponsors
- Attainment and delivery of seven National events at the A.M Ramsay Regatta Course
- In-depth review completed for all fees and membership types
- Board Governance improvements (structure and compliance)

There have been many positives given the challenges we have all faced, and we believe that the following key areas will require our attention over the next 18 months to continue the overall growth and development of the sport.

- Develop a Facility Business Case for West Lakes
- Develop an Asset Management Plan
- Support satellite facilities & programs (through indoor rowing)
- Develop a State Pathway model
- Formulate Professional Development resources
- Update and align all policies with Rowing Australia where necessary

We will continue to work towards delivering on all areas of the Strategic Plan and we welcome your involvement and feedback as we progress. Our aim is to build a stronger rowing community in SA and I thank Andrew Swift, Bec Lannan, Alacoque Tunny, Toni Ryan, Brett Ralph, fellow Directors and the many volunteers for your efforts to lead this direction for our rowing community in SA.



Given the additional requirements (COVID Marshals, security, livestreaming, health and safety resources) to continue the delivery of the sport during COVID-19 to meet the Government restrictions, as well as the major unexpected electrical issue at the Rowing SA facility it was an unavoidable result. Regarding the cash generated result for 2022, if these additional expenses are removed, it is broadly in line with the budgeted result. In addition, there was a significant change to the revenue generated from 2020/21 to 2021/22 due to Rowing SA hosting the 2021 Australian Masters Rowing Championships.

It also highlighted the significant low cost associated to competing in SA, which is unsustainable. To solve this, a comprehensive cost analysis of our sport was completed and an adjustment to membership fees for next season was approved. We expect Rowing SA will be better equipped to continue to be in a financial position to grow and develop the sport appropriately.

A Special General Meeting was held in February to vote on a new Constitution. The outcome was unsuccessful, and the Board resolved that further consultation with the community will take place throughout next season to address some of the recommendations raised at the SGM. We look forward to your input during the upcoming consultation process.

On behalf of the Board, office and rowing community I would like to acknowledge and thank the outgoing long serving Chair and Board member Philip Paterson. Philip has been an integral member of the Rowing SA Board who has supported the Association through its governance development and financial performance for almost the past decade. We thank Philip for his commitment and service to Rowing SA.

In July this year all RSA board members undertook a comprehensive Board self-assessment program using the VICSPORT template for sporting boards. This is a 61-point individual assessment under 6 main headings covering Board Structure & Purpose, Election & Appointment of Board Members, Board Induction, Board Behaviour & Culture, Board Performance and finally Competencies & Skills.

The results are currently under review and will be used to guide future development of board skills and function generally and particularly improve our induction process for new board members, all of which will benefit the ongoing development of rowing in SA for rowers across all ages from school to Masters.

We look forward to welcoming all new board members coming on-board and your new board will continue working to advance the Association, which has been given to the board by the membership. I thank any outgoing board members, and one board member who has reached his full-term and cannot re-stand next year is Greg Melbourne. We acknowledge and thank Greg for his contributions to the board during the last four terms.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

The 2021/22 regatta season was expected to have several COVID-19 related restrictions to continue to be in place, and fortunately only minor restrictions remained. Training and competitions were able to continue for the majority of the season.

Overall, the season was positive with membership remaining steady. I thank all clubs, schools and members for working with Rowing SA to achieve the season results. The ever-changing nature of the SA Government Public Health Orders and COVID-19 Safety Plans meant everyone had to adapt at short notice which was greatly appreciated.

The important role of our volunteers was even more apparent this season as regattas required additional COVID-19 assistance to ensure they occurred. The continued commitment and dedication of our volunteers throughout the season is inspiring and appreciated. I would like to acknowledge the Board members and especially the staff at Rowing SA - Bec Lannan, Alacoque Tunny, Toni Ryan and Brett Ralph. This team went above and beyond to ensure that regattas could be held. Their passion for the sport is obvious for all to see and their dedication mirrors that of our volunteers.

We've seen a great performance from our elite athletes at the Tokyo Olympic Games, the recent World Cup Regatta, Trans-Tasman Regatta, underage World Championships and we look forward to seeing our SA athletes competing at the upcoming Open World Rowing Championships.

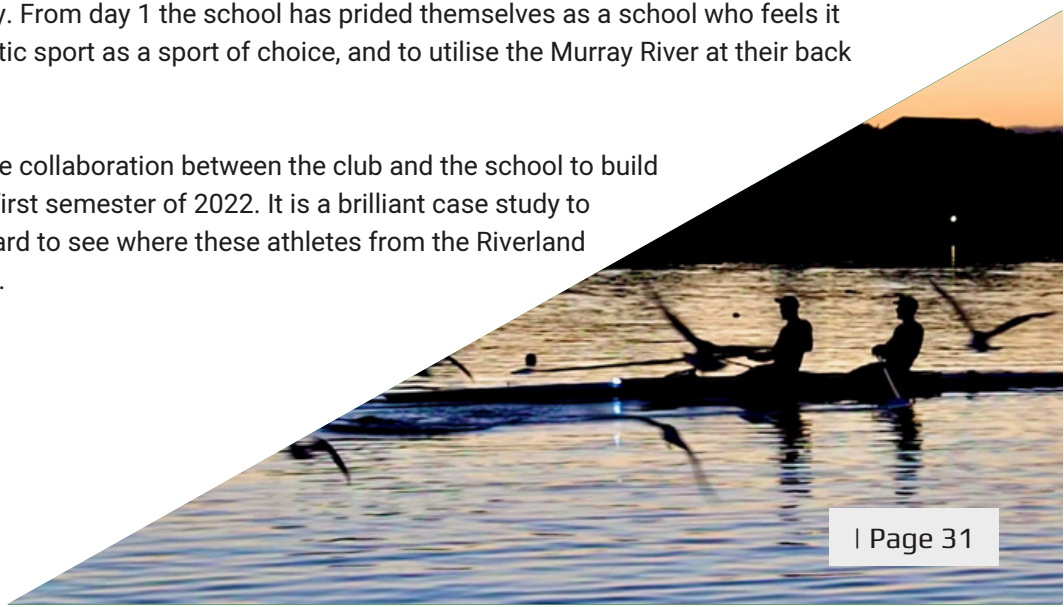
At the 2022 Australian Masters Championships in Ballarat, there was a remarkable result from our SA Masters athletes both in the club and interstate events. Congratulations to all that competed, those who won medals, and to the State Men's Eight who won the Interstate coxed Eight event back-to-back, and the State Women's Eight who competed strongly for their silver medal in the Interstate coxed Eight event.

At the 2022 Australian Rowing Championships in March there were convincing results from the underage athletes and saw the success of Wilderness School who won the Australian Schools Trophy for the first time by a South Australian school. The results achieved by a spread of many of our SA schools and clubs was a delight to witness in Nagambie.

It's not all about performance success and results. All of us started somewhere and for most of us it was from the grassroots of sport, and we have seen a great example of an exciting grassroots program start in the Riverland this year.

Renmark Rowing Club partnered up with a brand new school, St Francis of Assisi College when they opened their doors in January. From day 1 the school has prided themselves as a school who feels it necessary to feature an aquatic sport as a sport of choice, and to utilise the Murray River at their back door.

It has been exciting seeing the collaboration between the club and the school to build numbers on the water in the first semester of 2022. It is a brilliant case study to learn from and we look forward to see where these athletes from the Riverland evolve to in the coming years.





CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

FINANCE, AUDIT & RISK

Before 2022, Rowing SA had not conducted a significant review and analysis of their fees in the past 5 years. Consideration was taken into the cost for each club and member to participate in the sport of rowing in South Australia, but also the sustainability of the sport. Our fees were analysed across all States and Territories to assist the formulation of the new 2022/23 fees. The profit from the Rowing SA facility has been subsidising the competitive membership costs, which has highlighted a significant difference (for the benefit of SA members) between what SA charges in membership fees and what other States charge. Rowing SA wants to continue to pass on savings to our members, however cannot move past the fact that the Rowing SA facility currently requires significant maintenance. The adjustments made to form the proposed 2022/23 fees have been made to better align each membership type and reflect its true value.

FACILITIES & INFRASTRUCTURE

We remain committed to ensure that the infrastructure at West Lakes is well positioned to meet the needs of rowing into the future.

Rowing SA continues to manage and make extensive use of its property at West Lakes, and the Alex Ramsay Regatta Course for year-round rowing and other activities. The non-rowing activities include Canoeing, Dragon Boating, Triathlon, Surf Life Saving and Open Water Swimming. Additionally, each year over 15,000 school students use the waterway and some course infrastructure as participants in the West Lakes Aquatic Centre program (under the State Government's Department of Education & Child Development) – a tenant at Rowing SA's West Lakes facility.

Solar was installed and activated on the Rowing SA property with Matrix Solar Solutions in June 2022. The 39.96KW system had 108 panels installed on the roof at the Southern end of the boat sheds and two inverters installed in a locked cage on the Southern end. Rowing SA paid \$29,500 for the installation of the system and a rebate of \$18,438.70 covered the remaining amount. The system is anticipated to significantly reduce the electricity costs of the facility.

Projects including painting improvements to all bathroom areas and a balustrade replacement above OAR Café/in front of the office are expected for completion next season.

Thank you to Brett Ralph, Barny Cundell and Tim Ward for their assistance in the maintenance and in completing ongoing tasks at the West Lakes facility.

PARTNERSHIPS & COMMUNICATIONS

We continued our strong partnership with Surf Life Saving SA, to provide our on-water safety coverage at our major regattas. Thank you to the team at Surf Life Saving SA; Damien, Danny, Sonya and the many lifeguards we had on the water in either an IRB or a Jet Ski.

Rowing SA thank our partners and supporters for their ongoing support over the 2021/22 season. The State Government through the Office of Recreation, Sport & Racing (ORS&R), along with the Department of Planning, Transport & Infrastructure (DPTI) continue to provide funding and support to maintain our operational services and management of the Regatta Course at West Lakes. Our strong relationship continues with the City of Charles Sturt Council.

Thank you to our partners Bendigo Bank through the West Beach & Districts Community Bank Branch, AON Insurance, Fulham Funerals, TAPP Electrical, Largs Bay & Seaton Swim Centres, Gentle Touch Orthodontics, Lowe Farms and Hayley Staltari at Harris Real-estate. We also acknowledge the ongoing support from SASI for continuing the performance pathway for our athletes in SA; and Ann Koch and Phillip Mangelsdorf for continuing to promote the sport in SA through photography and media relations.

Rowing Australia (RA) continues its increased focus on a collaborative approach with the State Associations and we thank them for the leadership they have provided during COVID-19 and acknowledge the challenging decisions that were made in relation to the key annual events. We look forward to continuing our strong relationship in growing the sport in SA.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge the achievement of Mr Alan Lindsay Southcott who was awarded an AM for his significant service to rowing as a competitor, administrator and coach, in the 2022 Queens Birthday honours. Lindsay's rowing coaching career was a remarkable highlight. Like his father Alan, Lindsay was also President of South Australian Rowing and Patron of Torrens Rowing Club. He was the SA Councillor for Rowing Australia for eleven years. We thank Lindsay and acknowledge him and his family for the contributions to rowing in SA for many decades.

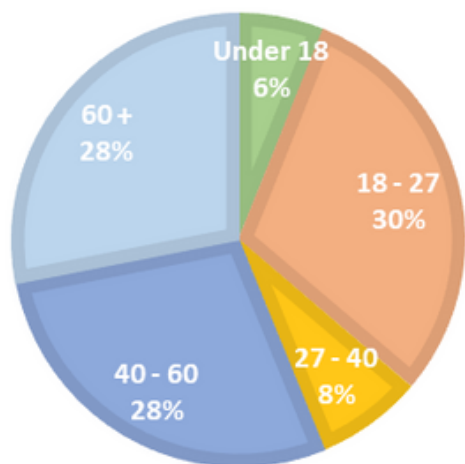
COMPETITIONS AND MEMBERSHIP REPORT

COMPETITIONS AND MEMBERSHIP

The 2021-22 Season saw 1788 members compete in 29 events throughout the Winter and Summer seasons. The division between club and school members was steady with around 25% of our Membership being club athletes and 75% being school athletes. Dual Members (athletes whose primary membership is with a school but also hold an affiliation to a club) accounted for 6% of total memberships.

Within the group of athletes belonging to a Club only we have seen a slight increase in the 18-27 year old age group.

Our competitions continue to grow and satisfying demand for opportunities to compete continues to be a significant focus of our regatta planning and delivery process.

Throughout the 2021-22 season the majority of our 'milestone' regattas received record entries.

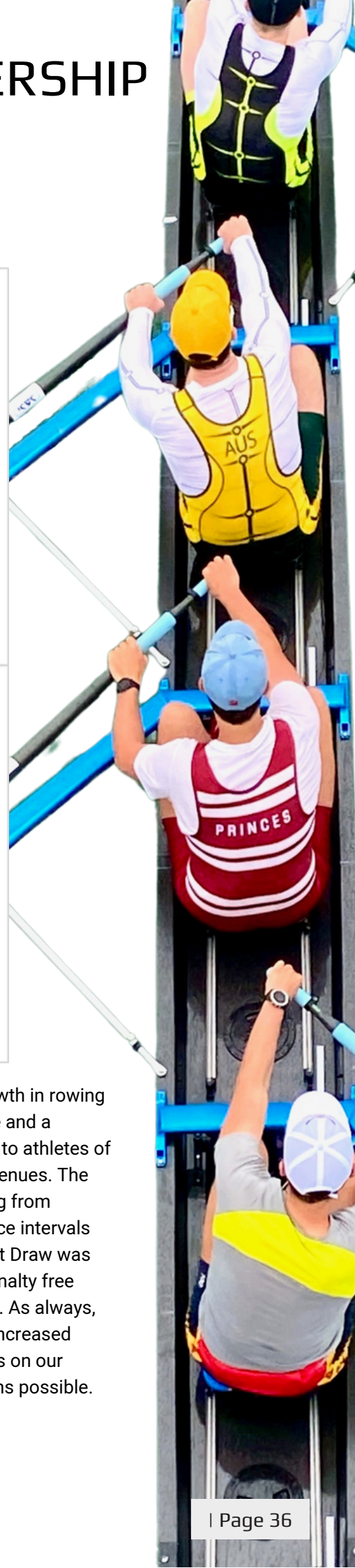

The SA State Championships continue to go from strength to strength with a significant increase in entries across all categories with the exception of Open Lightweight events. It was pleasing to see heats and finals were required for both the Men's and Women's Open Eights with 11 and 12 entries respectively. Data indicates the depth of fields in State Championship events is increasing and responding well to the addition of new events, while the Vacancy Rate (the percentage of events with 2 crews entered, row-overs, and non-events) is steadily decreasing and is now at its lowest recorded rate (15% for Men's events and 8% for Women's events).

COMPETITIONS AND MEMBERSHIP REPORT

OVERVIEW OF SA STATE CHAMPIONSHIP ENTRIES (exc. School & Para events)



The increase in entries is great for competition and is indicative of continued growth in rowing in South Australia broadly. However, it has also represented a logistical challenge and a significant increase in the workload of our Officials and Volunteers, the time cost to athletes of competing at regattas, and the scarcity of space and other resources at regatta venues. The 2022 Riverland Regatta for example, had two jam packed days of racing – running from 8:00am – 6:00pm Saturday, and 7:45am – 3:30pm Sunday mostly on 4 minute race intervals and encompassing a huge 227 races. Similarly, the March West Lakes at the Draft Draw was slated to run from 8:00am – 6:00pm before significant withdrawals during the penalty free period. There are obviously limits to what can be accommodated within a regatta. As always, moving forward our main concerns will be managing these limits and balancing increased competition demand, already densely packed racing schedules, and the pressures on our incredibly hard-working Officials and Volunteers group who make our competitions possible.

DEVELOPMENT AND PATHWAY REPORT

With the impacts and precautions of Covid subsiding, development within SA has begun to rebuild and gain momentum. There were still some limitations including restricted spectators and increased safety measures. To help with these restrictions the livestream service was continued throughout the season and educational commentary provided. Thank you to all of our volunteer commentators. We also had Covid marshals at all events to ensure everyone was social distancing and staying safe so we could enjoy the entirety of the season.

Competition was fierce with increasing entry numbers in both local and country regattas. The 2021 Australian Indoor Rowing Championships were a huge success with growing participation across the state, 28 medals won, and records being broken in multiple categories. Additionally, Loreto won the Schoolgirls point score and came 2nd overall in the Bont Rowing competition. Coles sponsored Adelaide High athletes to compete which was fantastic for competition participation. Rowing SA has set up and will be running the South Australia Indoor Rowing League including long distance and a sprint event.

We sent athletes to Perth in July on the Pathway Performance Tour. The purpose of the trip is to bring together some of the top school athletes from a variety of schools (boys and girls) to row together and get exposure to the wider rowing community. We are looking to show a pathway into the Men's and Women's State Youth VIII's.

The SASI Talent identification continues to make strides developing young talent. In late July a TID testing week was conducted and a Para intake is scheduled for October. We look forward to growing the Para competition and building strong competition within SA.

The 2021/2022 season awards breakfast was a success with over 100 attendees. This was a great way to celebrate the accomplishments of individuals, crews and clubs/schools as a whole.

The clubs winter programs continue to grow with students enrolling and gaining a connection to a club before leaving school. This encourages kids to join a club after they leave school and help improve retention rates across the state. Rowing SA would like to thank all the clubs taking the initiative to start these programs.

Coastal is an up-and-coming discipline. Rowing SA is part of the working group with RA to help create the strategic plan. Overall, the state is in a good position to build from as we explore the development landscape and cement strong pathways to success.

COURSE MANAGER REPORT

The 2021/22 season has seen approximately 1200 hours of labour to maintain the course to its current international standard. This past years main purchases have been 500 new soft pliable buoys (\$6000), and are slowly being introduced into service as old buoys fail, or are lost. It is hoped that another 500 buoys will be purchased in the next 12 months

Please note that Lane 4 (indicated by yellow buoys), has a dual purpose. On Regatta days it easily identifies Lane 4 for both competitors and spectators. While in training, it will act as the neutral or safety lane that will separate rowing traffic. Please DO NOT row in this lane during training. Always refer to the 'Rowing Training Map' displayed on the finish pontoon. It clearly explains traffic flow and general rowing rules on the course. These are here for everybody's safety, so please follow diligently.

Rowing SA will continually reinforce DPTI Marine Rules for lighting that must be displayed on your boat during early morning /evening, and poor light conditions. There has been a fantastic response from the rowing public, so keep up the great work. There is a light sensitive Red light on the top level of the Finish Tower that will indicate when you should have lights on your boat (IE. If the Red light is ON, you MUST have lights on your boat. (Don't forget to replace your batteries when they start to dim, remembering that these lights need to be seen from 1km away).

It was another long season with lots of changes due to Covid, the office and Board continued to put in place steps to keep regattas going, even to the extent where spectators were required to wear masks, while not ideal we were able to present a full season of racing. We had some tricky racing conditions due to wind and weather but I don't think we lost any races this year, so well done everyone.

We managed to get one new umpire trained last season, well done Christina Morner. Unfortunately we don't have any new people/umpires in training, while we get one or two new umpires trained each year we also lose a few each year. With the seasons being so long and the same very dedicated people attending most regattas, it becomes a huge work load on a small group, to this end the Mannum regatta was nearly cancelled due to insufficient umpires, if not for surf rescue being there the regatta would have been cancelled. I can only say we need more people to join us, please ask people, parents and friends who attend the regattas if they would like to help.

One good outcome from last season is that due to my absence from some regattas after Christmas, Steve Pennington and Paul Knight took turns at running regattas, they are now both capable of being President of the Jury at any regatta, we just need enough umpires and two regattas can be run on one day.

I mentioned last year we have a new arrangement with Surf life Saving S.A. while they have a roster and we get different people every week they are learning very quickly what we require, the standard of service is getting better all the time, so hopefully we will get less complaints about the odd wash or two, but I must say it is great to have professional rescue at our regattas. Additionally, during winter about 20 of our umpires and volunteers updated their first aid.

I must thank all who helped throughout the year, without their help rowing does not happen.

MASTERS REPORT

In November 2021, we wrote to Club Presidents outlining some of the changes that RSA had introduced in response to feedback that had been received in the previous 6 months from Masters Rowers to improve regatta programming. We also included recently updated RSA MC Terms of Reference. We asked for feedback on those changes and further suggestions to improve Masters Rowing.

We noted that in general Masters rowers seem satisfied with changes to regatta programming & scheduling that occurred last year (2021). We have also had verbal and written communication with a number of experienced Masters rowers. Additional input was provided from Andrew Swift and Bec Lannan (Rowing SA Admin) who had already done the 2021 State Masters Review.

Good feedback was subsequently received from some of the clubs outlining general satisfaction with improvements and some suggestions to improve:

1. The Masters State Selection process published deadlines and communication to rowers.
2. The handicaps and composite crew issues.

We notified the newly appointed Selectors and the State Coaches who were advised of their responsibilities in this important area of protocol; and process.

Continuing involvement in the pathway saw the SASI coaches and athletes involved in the SA State Team, SA Pathway team, time trials and winter performance squads.

The Murray Bridge shed was utilised over the year, supporting regular training, camps and gave the U19 M4- a great opportunity for some intense coaching from the tinnie in their preparation towards the Junior World Championships.

The continued work in the pathway space links the identified school leavers into the SASI system over winter, to give these athletes opportunity to learn and start to transition into a high-performance training environment. This year, the success of this program working in partnership with the schools has resulted in the selection of the junior boys onto the Australian team.

The program has already identified the next group of athletes to work in the winter performance program, and the squad trains together both on water, and in the SASI gym.

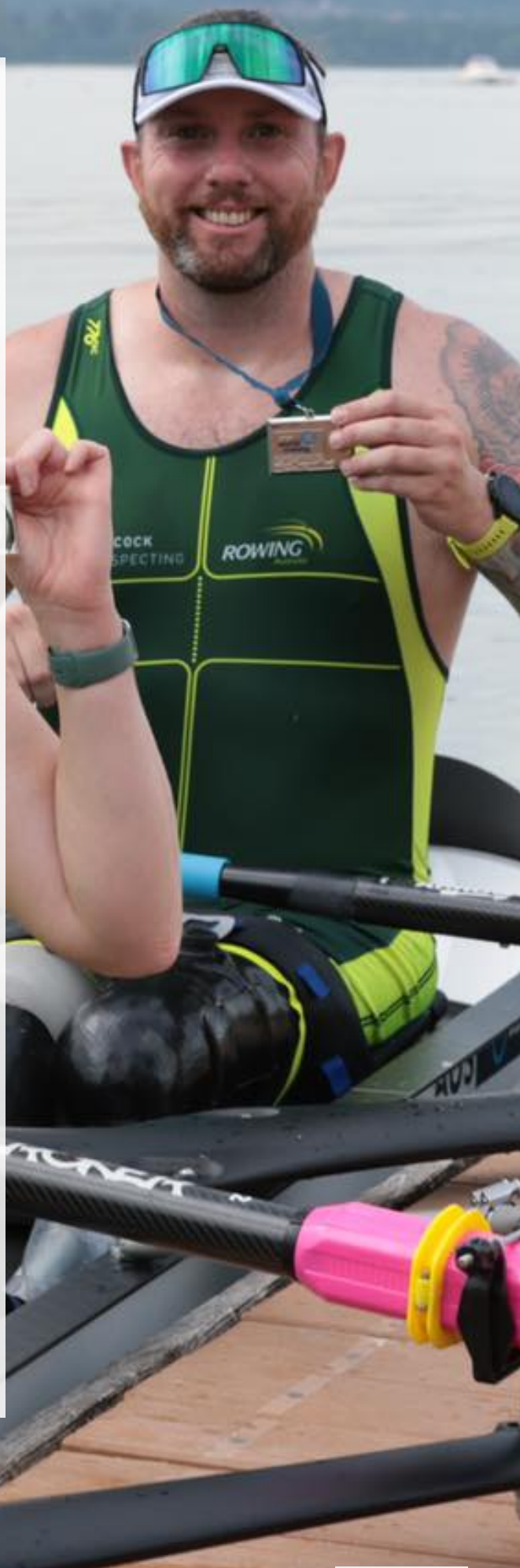
